Exploring Gippsland's offshore wind potential

We're excited to be exploring Victoria's offshore wind potential off the south coast of Gippsland. The Star of the South project would harness strong offshore winds in Bass Strait to power Victorian homes.

Transmission route selected

We've been investigating transmission route options to connect electricity generated by wind turbines in the sea to the Latrobe Valley.

The Star of the South project includes a transmission system of cables and substations. We're committed to using underground cables, unless it's not technically feasible or where overhead lines would have a lower impact.

We selected a transmission route for further investigation after talking with landholders, local communities and government, and doing site investigations throughout 2020 on three different options.

The route we're progressing would come to shore around Reeves Beach and travel underground through Darriman, Giffard West and Hiamdale to the Latrobe Valley.

Of the three options considered, this one has the best overall outcome and will be progressed through planning, approvals and design. We're talking with landowners whose property may be suitable to host the transmission infrastructure.

Studying the marine environment

A key part of planning for Australia's first offshore wind project is collecting environmental data to inform the project's design and approvals process.

We're partnering with some of Australia's leading scientists and research agencies including CSIRO and Monash, Deakin and Curtin universities to collect data on five key marine study areas.

We're using the data we collect for:

- Environmental assessments
- Models to predict potential project impacts
- Comparing pre- and post-construction conditions
- Building scientific knowledge of the area.

Subject matter experts are collecting, verifying and analysing the data. Findings will be publicly available through the project's assessment and approvals process over the coming years.

Environmental assessment and approvals

We're going through comprehensive environmental assessment and approval processes.

A coordinated government assessment through an Australian Environment Impact Statement (EIS) and Victorian Environment Effects Statement (EES) will be used to assess potentially significant environmental, social, economic and planning aspects of the project. We'll prepare our EIS/EES over the coming years. There'll be opportunities to get involved and provide feedback.

The Australian Government's EIS Assessment Guidelines and Victorian Government's EES Scoping Requirements will be released for public comment soon. We'll keep you updated on this process and ways you can share your feedback.
